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Synopsis

Geography 535 course is designed to introduce a broad set of issues and approaches to the study of international migration and settlement. The first part of the course will survey key concepts and theories of migration, and the question of regulation, particularly the balance of power between the international order vs. national regulatory systems. This will involve a discussion of how migration policies are framed and operationalized. Next, we consider several major issues that intersect with migration: national security, technology, and gender. The third set of seminars will focus on what could be called 'transactional' concerns: how people traverse boundaries and make connections between places; and how Europe attempts to control migration from surrounding regions, as well as migrants within the EU. Finally, the course will close on the question of integration policies and processes, particularly the recent challenges to the idea of multiculturalism (which was so widely supported a generation ago), and the concern that has arisen over the relationship between diversity and social cohesion.

Evaluation of students

- Major essay of 5,000 words, due Friday, December 13, 2019 (80%).
 - The topic must be approved by the instructor, preferably by the end of October.
- Class contribution (20%), based upon:
 - General contribution to discussion.
 - Each week we will begin our conversation with a round-table survey of the students, who
 will each have an opportunity to raise issues they would like to discuss during the seminar
 (1 minute each). The ability of students to help shape the nature of our debate will also be
 taken into consideration in assigning the course contribution grade.

Note: I plan to be away for the week that includes Wednesday, October 9, at a meeting of the Transatlantic Council on Migration. I may be called away at another time in the term but I will try to ensure this does not happen.
