This year, our theme, **"Belonging and Mobility in a Transnational World,"** encapsulates the complex interplay between identity, work, and connectivity across borders.

Keynote speaker and panel discussions will address pressing issues such as the impact of migration policies on migrant experiences, the dynamics of intergroup relations in contexts of immigration, the nexus of work and belonging among immigrant workers, bordering practices, and the relations between global diasporas and social identities. We aim to foster discussions that transcend disciplinary boundaries, providing insights from diverse perspectives and methodologies.

Join us as we navigate the evolving landscapes of migration and mobility, seeking to understand, celebrate, and harness the transformative power of human movement in a transnational world.

About the UBC Centre for Migration Studies

The UBC Centre for Migration Studies (CMS) is an interdisciplinary network committed to advancing the study of migration, mobilities, and belonging. The Centre is located in the traditional, ancestral, and unceded territory of the x^wməθk^wəýəm (Musqueam). Our work extends across unceded Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish), səlilwəta? (Tsleil-Waututh) and other Coast Salish territories in what is commonly known as Metro Vancouver, British Columbia.

Since its formal establishment in 2020, CMS has served as an incubator for transformative research within the academy and beyond. With our 90 faculty affiliates, 75 graduate student affiliates, and numerous community partners and practitioners, we work together to facilitate publicly-engaged dialogue that fosters inclusive and just communities and influences policy. CMS does this through a rich and diverse array of research collaborations and programming initiatives. We facilitate over 50 events per year, hosting lectures, workshops, conferences, and other events for the UBC community and more. Our signature initiatives include a Graduate Certificate in Migration Studies, the annual CMS-Sector Research Collaborations Day (fall), and the annual International Research Conference (spring). Our work is underpinned by a fundamental commitment to exploring ways to decolonize migration studies by grappling with the intersection of migration, settler colonialism, empire, and Indigeneity.

Prof. Nina Glick Schiller

Emeritus Professor, University of Manchester, UK, and University of New Hampshire, USA

Nina Glick Schiller is Emeritus Professor, University of Manchester, UK and University of New Hampshire, USA, founding editor of *Identities* and co-editor of *Anthropological Theory*. She is currently a scholar of Excellence with the CERC Migration program at the Toronto Metropolitan University. Her research topics include urbanism, urban regeneration, transnational migration, migration services, migration and development, critiques of methodological nationalism and the ethnic lens, racialization and power, dispossession and displacement, cosmopolitan sociability, and the construction of risk. She has conducted research in Haiti, the USA, the UK, and Germany.

Her books include: Nations Unbound: Transnational Projects, Postcolonial Predicaments and the Deterritorialized Nation-States, Towards a Transnational Perspective on Migration: Race, Class, Ethnicity, and Nationalism Reconsidered, Georges Woke Up Laughing: Long Distance Nationalism and the Search for Home, Beyond Methodological Nationalism: Research Methodologies for Cross-Border Studies, Cosmopolitan Sociability: Locating Transnational Religious and Diasporic Networks, Whose Cosmopolitanism? Critical Perspectives, Relationalities and Discontent, Regimes of Mobility: Imaginaries and Relationalities of Power, Locating Migration: Rescaling Cities and Migrants; and Migrants and City Making: Dispossession, Displacement and Urban Regeneration.
